Oxfam at ASEAN Inclusive Business Forum in Lao PDR

On 23-24 September 2024, Oxfam in partnership with UNESCAP, OECD and the Lao Ministry of Industry and Commerce is supporting and participating in the 7th ASEAN Inclusive Business Forum in Lao PDR. In a keynote address, Oxfam's Asia Regional Director highlighted the critical role of businesses in addressing pressing global challenges.

The address emphasized the urgent need for businesses to adopt inclusive and responsible business practices to combat climate change, promote gender equality, ensure decent work, and fair wages, and protect the rights of indigenous people and migrant workers. It also underscored the crucial role of ASEAN governments in creating an enabling environment for businesses to embrace these practices and inspire other stakeholders to join the movement.

Oxfam at 24th ASEAN ENERGY BUSINESS FORUM 2024 (AEBF-24)

On 26th September 2024, Oxfam and its partners participated in the Strategic Multistakeholder Forum on Just and Inclusive Energy Transition in ASEAN 24th ASEAN ENERGY BUSINESS FORUM during the 42nd ASEAN Ministers of Energy Meeting in Vientiane to promote gender-just energy transition framework in the development of the ASEAN Partnership for Energy Cooperation 2026-2030. In a keynote address, Oxfam's Asia Regional Director highlighted the Role of a Just and Inclusive Transition. A just energy transition means more than just shifting from fossil fuels to renewables-it is about equity, social justice, and ensuring that vulnerable communities, especially women, ethnical groups, and marginalized groups, are active participants in this process.

The need for education, training, and capacity-building initiatives that will equip the region's workforce to participate in the emerging energy markets is paramount. Ensuring that women have equal opportunities to lead and benefit from the transition is essential. Women in ASEAN make up just 8% of the total workforce in the energy sector.

Overcoming these barriers, which include gender bias and lack of supportive networks, will enable women to participate more fully and contribute to the region's energy transition.

Achieving a just energy transition requires collaboration across all sectors: government, private companies, civil society, academia, and communities. As emphasized in the recent civil society statements from the 2nd CSO Regional Convening in Phnom Penh on 27-29 August, fostering the transparent and inclusive consultation mechanisms that empower all stakeholders to contribute meaningfully to policy development. An ASEAN where energy transition not only tackles climate change but also promotes social justice, economic resilience, and gender equity. An initiative that Oxfam also highlighted will benefit from the support of inclusive and responsible businesses."

The LFTU has growing roles and policy framework to protect marginalized workers both formal and informal economic sectors, well aligned with Oxfam and ILO ambitious on promoting social projection and decent work for all.

Amuda Mishra from the *Asia Feminist Coalition* underscored the importance of amplifying feminist voices in the care discourse.

While we've made meaningful progress on transformative care policies both regionally and nationally across Asia, there is still much work to be done. We must prioritize greater investment in care data, infrastructure, and services to create real, lasting change for caregivers. Let's unite to drive these crucial investments forward and make a tangible impact in the lives of those who dedicate themselves to care.

MFAT activity in 16 districts

Since July until September 2024, the Gender and Inclusion program team includes 4 CSO partners (GDA, IWAA, CAKID, CHIAs) Government partner (LFTU) are implementing the Essential Cash and Livelihoods Support project for the to Vulnerable Communities Affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic in Laos PDR, which funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs & Trade (MFAT), New Zeland Government. In September, the program team supporting the Community grants delivered to communities to the 102 most vulnerable villages in 16 districts, 5 provinces through participatory decision-making and could implement the project as chart below:

Thought preparation process, community participatory decision-making. and are followed by the community work plan. Work plans include capacity building for the Community grant Management Committee (CMC) for the 102 villages selected. The community has total 109 priority needs, mostly focused in upgrading community water (in sector of public work and wash sector) total of 52 schemes, followed by public work and transportation for 36 schemes, See diagram.

As per the combined community plan, priority need and available budget with community contribution, the project will provide capacity building and training to the village grant management committees, particularly to those who will administer the grants, on accountability, ownership and use of funds.



The facilitator shall also support discussion on the use of community and business grants, monitoring, coordinating, and considering lessons learned from previous and existing activities. Other community-based committees will be established to support in management and monitoring of community grants, business development activities, and continued capacity building after the project.

And supporting the Micro-enterprise grants delivered to individuals or groups to increase the capacity of project partners and micro-enterprise, training has been provided for the The original plan was providing a grant for 15 individuals/groups. With the extension, an additional 300 grants were added to the original 15 individuals/groups. Four of the targeted group grants (40 members including 28 female members) were already implemented within goat-raising groups in Bokeo Province.

Women-led Business competition in Oudomxai and Savannakhet provinces

TO continue on the Green Women-led business competition, at the first to second week of September 2024, Gender and Inclusion team and CSO partner (ARMI) have been provided 2 days of training on business plans for 15 womenbusinesses from the southern led (Phongsaly and Oudomxai Provinces) and 15 women businesses from the southern (Savannakhet and region Saravanh provinces), the training course was relevance 1). includes areas as: Social/environmental impact of the business; Feasibility and relevance of business plan; 2). Budget management and own contribution are realistic, e.g. land. facilities. and budget...etc; 3).Strength of team/entrepreneur on marketing; 4).Growth potential and business scope; 5) Green Economy and sustainability.

Technical assistance has been provided for all group members. For remaining 311 micro-enterprise grants are in the process of implementation and some are preparing their business as planned for their business, all of the grants will be transferred and implement by December 2024. The project targeted to achieve 65% of model/good practice of microenterprise grants managed by individuals or groups and 70% of women-led microenterprise, as set in the guidelines and MERL plan. As per the diagram, total 828 HHs they included in total of 315 business.

The public speakers aims to strengthen hydro and meteorological data and information sharing at the communities so they are early prepare to manage disaster and adapt to climate change.

Oxfam joined International Coffee Day's Celebration in 2024 in Vientiane Centre, Vientiane Capital 27-29 October 2024

Coffee is one of the main Lao agricultural exports generating substantial cash income for farmers. The Lao coffee is mainly exported to the European Union, Vietnam, Japan, China, Korea, the USA, others. The coffee sector supports more than 20,000 producers and employs more than 300,000 people. Lao PDR produces two main types of coffee: Robusta and Arabica. The Bolaven Plateau in the South is the historical and main coffeeproducing area, representing 95% of the national production National production is estimated at 33,000 tons of coffee cherries per year. On labor light and social protection, the Lao coffee sector still faces many important challenges as most workers

are informally employed, facing low wages, insecure employment, deficits in decent working conditions, low access to social protection, lacking voice and and representation in their interactions with employers and buyers. Women face greater inequalities, while being often excluded from managerial and decision-making roles, and denied employment may be or face harassment during pregnancy. So, to engage the International Coffee Day 2024 on Highlights "Coffee: Your Daily Ritual, Our Journey". Oxfam Shared together with national partner Laos Federation of Trade Social Union(LFTU), Security Organization(SSO), ILO, and CSOs displayed information and good practices on strengthening informal workers including tea and coffee farmers' access to social security, occupational safety and health (OSH), and women empowerment. And also, joined a panel discussion on "Towards a greener and more inclusive economy: sustainable coffee production".

Beneficiary Stories



many developing countries, In including the Laos. entrenched cultural traditions and norms have posed challenges to promoting gender equality. Vansy Senyavong, the Chief Director of MHP, emphasizes the importance of empowering women and youth through education and sustainable income generation from agriculture and forest resources. Through the support from the SOLAR Project, MHP is facilitating training sessions for villagers on gender equality, disability rights, and social inclusion. These initiatives have not only enhanced understanding but have also fostered a sense of shared responsibility among community members towards protecting their environment and promoting gender equality.

By fostering dialogue and introspection on gender norms and equality, initiatives like those of MHP are paving the way for inclusive development and empowerment in the Lao PDR.



Traditionally, most households have operated as informal businesses with limited market access, working long hours under difficult conditions and generally without access to social protection. But things have started to change. Throughout the support from the SOLAR Project, the tea farmers of Paksong have been able to create a united effort to market and promote their teas, and thereby overcome previous awareness challenges to drive ever growing sales. "Some years ago, almost no Lao people drank Lao tea," Sengthong recalled, "but today many restaurants and hotels in the country buy tea from us, and I believe that in the future we may not be able to produce enough, especially in the dry season, because the number of orders is steadily increasing."

Now, almost every month the farmers participate in a training session on occupational safety and health, as well as related areas like social security, gender equality, disability and social inclusion. Sengthong is now starting to look beyond the immediate needs of members to the more distant future of the Paksong tea industry.



Supporting the Lao Government's efforts to promote sustainable development and gender equality in rural communities Blessed with lush landscapes and Stories from the SOLAR Project 83 rich natural resources, the Lao People's Democratic Republic is a country brimming with potential. However, despite the abundance of resources, many people in rural areas lack the knowledge and tools needed to harness these assets for their own benefit. Chansamone Phetbouasone, a Technical Officer at ASDSP, the association is dedicated to supporting Lao farmers in integrating sustainable practices into their work. with SOLAR Project support the ASDSP has started working closely with local government partners to form farming production groups in Paksong and Thateng districts and to empower women leadership in these groups.

Today, women can be seen taking a more active role in decision-making and in leading the direction of discussions at meetings, so that they have a greater say in community affairs. In addition, there are hopeful signs of greater equality among families, with men taking on more responsibility in household activities and showing more support for their wives and other womenfolk. the ASDSP are not only transforming lives but also paving the way for a more resilient and prosperous future for all.
