Dear reader,

HANDWASHING MATTERS

Consider for a moment what your hands have touched in the last one hour. Our hands do all sort of things for us – they open doors, holds newspaper, greets people, and so on.

Nevertheless, our hands, when left unclean have the potential to spread diseases, which makes it essential for everyone to wash their hands regularly.

For many decades, handwashing with soap and water has been considered one of the best defenses against many kinds of diseases and infections. UNICEF reports that the risk of life-threatening diseases like diarrhea can be reduced up to 40% among children, with regular handwashing using soap and water.

In the current situation, health experts have constantly reminded us that a simple act of washing hands with soap and water can go a long way to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Since the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, Oxfam in Nepal has been promoting handwashing as an essential behaviour to prevent the spread of the virus. Oxfam has been providing hygiene and dignity kits which includes essential hygiene items like soaps, toothbrush, towels, sanitary pads, etc. Besides, Oxfam since the beginning of the crisis, pedal-operated been installing handwashing stations, raising awareness through mass media, and have supported frontline health workers with equipment mike masks, gloves, face Continuing shield. etc. Oxfam's commitment to promote healthy hand hygiene, the Global Handwashing Day

celebrated in with numerous events across 12 districts of Nepal. events witnessed massive participation from the people, who came together at the same time to practice handwashing. Besides. raising awareness events and discussion community on handwashing using a unique approach called Mum's Magic Hands, to explain about the importance of Handwashing through storytelling were organized. Oxfam and its partners also conducted several social media campaigns to promote handwashing behaviour.

GLOBAL HANDWASHING DAY, 2020



Every year on October 15th, organizations, and individuals around the world celebrate Global Handwashing Day. The Global Handwashing Day is dedicated to advocating for handwashing with soap as an easy, effective, and affordable way to prevent diseases and save lives. Founded by the Global Handwashing Partnership, the event brings together different organizations to advocate, design, test, and replicate creative ways to encourage people to wash their hands with soap at critical times.

The first Global Handwashing Day was held in 2008, when over 120 million children around the world washed their hands with soap in more than 70 countries. Since then, the event is endorsed by governments, NGOs, civil society, private companies and individuals as an opportunity to advocate for healthy hand hygiene.

The 2020 Global Handwashing Day theme was "Hand Hygiene for All." This year the campaign calls out on civil society to scale up hand hygiene, especially through handwashing with soap. With the unprecedented surge in COVID-19 cases all around the world, the campaign also reminds us to work toward universal access and practice of handwashing with soap for a healthy future.

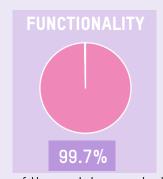
THE POWER OF PEDALLING

Handwashing with clean water and soap is essential to prevent the spread of COVID-19. However, using water from taps can be risky as multiple hand comes in contact while twisting the lever.

The rampant surge of COVID-19 spurred an innovative idea of developing a pedal-operated handwashing station. This new technique of handwashing didn't require users to touch the tap lever with their hands to access water. Instead, they could access the water by pressing the lever with their foot.

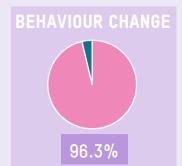
Oxfam in Nepal has been installing pedal-operated handwashing stations schools, health institutes. government offices, and public areas, where people can easily access these handwashing facilities. To assess the effectiveness of handwashing stations a study was carried in Rautahat and Sarlahi districts among identify respondents to maintenance, and sustainability of handwashing stations. The following are some findings of the study:

Percentage of HWS in use



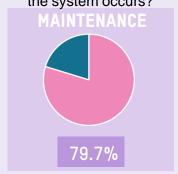

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS OF GLOBAL HANDWASHING DAY



This year, on Global Handwashing Day, the Hygiene Behaviour Change Coalition(HBCC) partners organized a virtual event to raise awareness about the importance of handwashing and to indulge in dialogue with different like-minded organizations to promote handwashing behaviour across Nepal. The event was jointly organized by Mahalaxmi Municipality, Unicef, Oxfam, Action Aid, and Water Aid. During the event, each organization shared their progress, success, and learnings in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. Oxfam organized a live session, where a pedal-operated handwashing station was handed over to Siddhi Mangal Secondary school in Siddhipur. Besides, a live event was also conducted to demonstrate Handwashing steps using Mum's Magic Hand technique, which uses storytelling as a major motivator to practice handwashing. Also, different social media campaigns were organized by Oxfam and its partners.

The Global Handwashing Day commenced in Rautahat district with overwhelming community participation with more than 3,50,000 people washing their hands at the same time. The ceremony was inaugurated by the District Coordination Committee Chairperson Mr. Ram Ekbal Ray along with Chief District Officer, Mr. Indradev Yadav. The event received prominent coverage from local FM and newspapers.



The HBCC project celebrated handwashing day in Kailali, Kanchanpur, Baitadi, Dadeldhura, and Surkhet districts with different events. The event, which was organized in close coordination with local authorities, carried out several activities such as the distribution of bucket with tap and soaps, installation of pedal-operated handwashing stations, handwashing demonstrations, and community level handwashing events.



More than 600 security personnel from Area Police Post Chandrapur, Rautahat joined the handwashing campaign in Rautahat district. RDC/0xfam has installed more than 20 pedal-operated handwashing stations at different security posts (Nepal Army Camp, Police Post and Armed Police Force) under the COVID-19 response project.

Ex-Member of Constituent Assembly Ms. Kiran Yadav and Chairperson of District Water Supply and Sanitation Office, Sarlahi, Mr. Sharan Bhagat, along with 32 individuals of Naya Namuna Basti- Basbariya Rural Municipality Ward 2, Manpur, Sarlahi celebrated Global Handwashing Day. More than 2,90,000 people participated and washed their hands at the same time during the event.

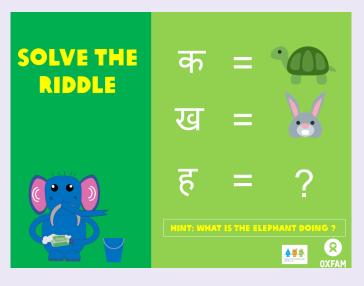

SOCIAL MEDIA CAMPAIGNS





This handwashing day Oxfam conducted a social media campaign to engage with the netzines to change the ABC's of education.

Our message was simple – how about we start saying 'H is for Handwashing'

The campaign which ran on Facebook gathered a total organic reach of 9500 in one week. The posts were tailored towards driving engagement, as it included riddles, questions and public opinion.





Oxfam's partner organization ENPHO raised awareness about the preventive measures of COVID-19 through its Facebook page, generating more than 75000 reactions from the audience. The social media campaign also included a quiz competition and a photo contest, where people were asked to post their pictures, while washing their hands.

Similarly, Janahat Gramin Sewa Samiti (JGSS) ran a social media campaign with a hashtag #Mychildcleanhands. The campaign encouraged parents to post videos encouraging their children to wash their hands. Throughout the campaign, 27 videos were posted, with a total reach of 1000.

WHY MORE INVESTMENT IN HEALTH AND WASH?

A joint report titled 'Why More Investment in Health and WASH' was published by Oxfam and Humanitarian Accountability Monitoring Initiative (HAMI). The study was carried out in three palikas of Kapilbastu, Surkhet and Rautahat districts between the last week of June and the first week of July 2020 to assess the following:

- 1. The existing situation of the availability of health and WASH services and their effect on public, particularly women, children, and people with disability.
- 2. Identify gaps in the availability of health services.
- 3. Document gaps and provide recommendations to the governments at all levels to take necessary steps to address the gaps and tackle challenges.

The highlights of the study are as follows:

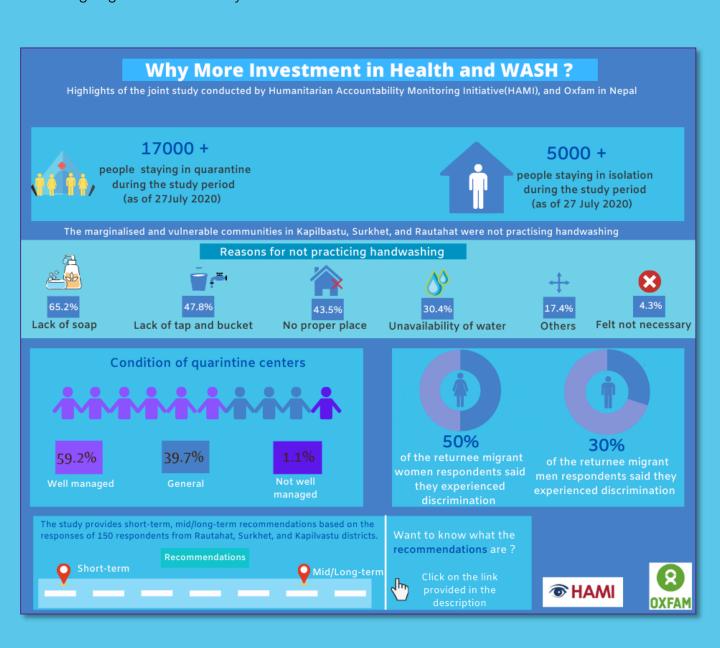
