- · To improve the participation of women and socially excluded groups in social, political, and economic activities and decision-making processes.
- · To strengthen the systems and capacities of government and local institutions towards promoting gender equality and social inclusion.



COMMUNITY CONTEXT BEFORE INTERVENTION

For over a decade, conflict in Northeast Nigeria has devastated communities in Adamawa State, especially Michika and Guyuk LGAs. Displacement, insecurity, and broken social systems have deepened gender inequalities, limiting women's access to education, healthcare, land, and leadership.

Women, IDPs, returnees, PWDs, and other vulnerable groups have been largely excluded from leadership and development processes. Traditional councils and decision-making platforms remain male-dominated, reinforcing inequality, time poverty, and economic marginalisation.

The core problem lies in deep-rooted systemic gender inequality:

- · Exclusion from leadership at all levels
- · Prevalent GBV and harmful practices like early marriage and land denial
- · Economic marginalisation due to time poverty, low literacy, and poor resource access

ACTIVITY MILESTONES

Key approaches deployed included training and retraining sessions, workshops, dialogue sessions with various stakeholders, phone-in radio programs.

TRAININGS SESSIONS (15 in each LGA)

community members trained (117 male, 122 female), with many applying the GALS knowledge to successfully start or expand businesses and invest in assets.

women trained in Transformative Leadership, leading to action plans and new leadership groups.

government and traditional leaders trained (258 males, 139 females) alongside community members.

community leaders were trained on gender-responsive budgeting, prioritizing maternal health and schools in Michika, and girls' enrollment and crèches in Guyuk.

3 GBV/HTP response trainings for Community Gender Champions, which led to action plans on the VAPP Act, awareness, and case handling.



Key stakeholders (99 women, 67 men) were engaged as part of the community entry project activity by Oxfam, CRUDAN and CEPAD teams across Michika and Guyuk LGAs through direct visits to local government secretariats and traditional palaces, securing vital support for the WoRGE project.



Community Gender Champions were identified and trained and became peer educators, reaching over 500 community members.

TIME POVERTY INSIGHTS (RCA FINDINGS) & INTERVENTION

Time spent on unpaid care work by women and men:

Installed 13 milling and de-husking machines (8 in Michika, 5 in Guyuk), each serving 20–50 households and saving ~1.5 hours per household daily.

of participating women report increased confidence and self-expression, reflecting WoRGE's lasting personal and community impact.

individuals attained key positions: In Michika, 3 women and 3 PWDs joined traditional councils; in Guyuk, 1 woman joined the Peace Committee, and the first female first-class chief was crowned.



74 individuals applied their GALS training to launch new businesses.



women allocated farmland in Michika and Guyuk LGAs.



individuals invested in livestock farming (including pig and goat rearing).



individuals expanded their existing businesses.



10 women acquired lands.



10 women built new homes.



individuals (women & PWDs) now in Traditional Councils.



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
